Warm Welcome

INTERIOR DESIGNER SCOTT YETMAN CREATES A FRESH, EAST COAST-INSPIRED HOME THAT'S PERFECT FOR HOSTING A CROWD.

THERE'S A REASON all the best parties end up in the kitchen. So much more than a place to cook, a great kitchen can be the anchor for a truly inviting home — especially one that belongs to serious entertainers. And that's exactly the case in this elegant country manor. The homeowners were downsizing and wanted a welcoming space where they could host friends and family and spend their downtime in sophisticated comfort.

Interior designer Scott Yetman and his team were part of the process from the beginning, signing on when there was nothing more than a two-acre plot of land on a quiet street in historic Knowlton, Que. The area has a mix of Victorian and mid-1800s Loyalist clapboard homes, which lend a distinctly East Coast vibe to the village — and it was that sensibility the homeowners hoped to capture in their New England-style house.

Inside, Yetman obliged by painting the home's wood-plank walls in classic white and using a palette of muted tones inspired by seaside-weathered wood for the floors and cabinetry. "The architectural backdrop is the same throughout," says Yetman. "What changes the character of each room is the artwork and the furniture, but the house itself reads as a unified whole."

Despite its modest 2,500-square-foot size, the open-concept floor plan, large windows and 14-foot vaulted ceilings make the house feel airy and spacious, and on the main floor, Yetman created a layout that invites movement and mingling.

Nearly a year after construction started, the homeowners hosted a celebratory dinner for friends. Guests savoured roast duck, risotto and the warm, refined atmosphere. The evening was "elegant but simple," says Yetman. Exactly what he'd hoped to achieve.

HOUSE & HOME: The kitchen is the most utilitarian room in the home. How did you strike a balance between form and function? SCOTT YETMAN: It's important to think "furniture," not "cabinets." We custom-designed the cabinets with raised diamond patterns so they feel more like furniture and we pulled the floor colour into the cabinetry for uninterrupted flow. Most of the appliances are in the background. The microwave is built in, and the island blocks the view of the stove from the dining room.

H&H: What's the key to entertaining in an open-concept kitchen?

SY: The beauty of hosting in an open kitchen is that you can talk to guests while you're preparing the meal. But you also have to keep things neat and orderly. I like using trays to prevent things from looking messy. They're easy to move around and can be used to display things like glassware, but they can also be put to use when you're entertaining. If you're having a party and want people to serve themselves drinks, just put everything on a tray on the island.

H&H: People tend to have strong opinions about marble countertops. Why did you use it in this kitchen? SY: So many people are afraid to use marble because they worry it will stain, but they've been rolling pastries on marble for thousands of years in Italy for a reason! It's a wonderful material; you just have to have a good sealant. The piece of marble the homeowner chose makes a beautiful backdrop because it has just the right tones for the room, from greige to a bit of grey, running through it.

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A pair of antique nickel pendants highlight the island. **Pendants**, Celadon.
